

What Attendees Reported: by the numbers

- Increased competence in addressing youth homelessness (6.7 before to 7.9 after, out of 10)
- Believe what they learned will improve their work (7.7)
- Confident they will be able to integrate what they learned into their work (7.5)
- Believed the greatest impacts will be in how they collaborate with other organizations (5 out of 6) and colleagues (4.8), and how they understand (4.8), address (4.7), and interact (4.7) with youth experiencing homelessness

Community Next Steps

• Engage youth:

- Meet youth where they are (block parties, schools, libraries, community centers, LGBTQIA+ centers)
- Ask engaged youth about friends and family situations
- Build relationships with youth in our programs, help them advocate for themselves and use their voice to make youth-driven change

• Incorporate youth voice:

- Thoughtfully/purposefully create or restart youth action/advisory boards/coalitions to inform planning and development; identify transportation for members
- Employ youth with lived experience; seek peer representation

Develop programs and supportive services for youth:

- Look into starting host homes, emergency shelters, drop-in centers, pop-ups, and other youth-friendly housing and support service programs
- Offer programs on healthy relationships, maintaining housing, building and maintaining credit, job readiness and training programs with connections to DSS and school system, relationships building and mentoring

• Explore funding and non-traditional partnerships in the community

- Develop plan to engage mainstream systems to address youth homelessness through an equity and healing lens
- Formalize institutional partnerships to combat loss of connections due to turnover
- School system will hold summer meetings with families who are experiencing homelessness
- Public/workforce engagement: reduce stigma, educate/sharing what we know/what we've learned, challenging ageism, classism, racism, and homophobia among coworkers and in policies, break down silos with communication (build a communication plan), rethink language around youth homelessness
- Do a system mapping: identify each system's assets, needs, and where to collaborate
- Collect and review data: identify regional needs; understand gaps in data collection
- Continue to learn and stay engaged
